Sin Study

Sin in Hebrew is **Châṭâ**: to miss the mark
Sin in Greek is **hamartanō**: to miss the mark

The mark is the glory of God.

Rom 3:23 For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God.

Gen 3:1-11

God said that if they eat the fruit of that tree they should surely die. This suggests that eating the fruit caused them to miss the mark.
This mark can be found in **Genesis 3:22-23**.

Rom 6:23 For the wages of sin is death...

Rom 5:12

Sin brought death to all.

Q: Should we fear death?

Matt 10:28

The fruit of the tree in the garden contained knowledge of good and evil.
Adam and Eve thought it was good to cover themselves. **Q:** Was this good?

Every good thought as well as evil thought is birthed from that fruit.

The fruit that was withheld from them was the fruit of the tree of life. **Gen 3:24**

If all have sinned and we cannot be good enough to 'hit the mark' we need some other way to have the fruit of life.

Mark 7:18-23

¹⁸ And he saith unto them, Are ye so without understanding also? Do ye not perceive, that whatsoever thing from without entereth into the man, it cannot defile him;

¹⁹ Because it entereth not into his heart, but into the belly, and goeth out into the draught, purging all meats?

²⁰ And he said, That which cometh out of the man, that defileth the man.

²¹ For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed **evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders,**

²² Thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride, foolishness:

²³ All these evil things come from within, and defile the man.

19 Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these; **Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness,**

20 **Idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies,**

21 **Envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings,** and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God.
